In our effort to bring you the freshest and most local food possible, we will be supporting Brookridge Farm in Lyman, located just four miles from Wolf Pine Farm. Brookridge Farm produces truly excellent certified organic raw milk as well as hay, beef, and maple syrup.

Brookridge Farm has a pastured herd of 48 Milking Shorthorn cows. A great website to learn more about Shorthorns, one of the oldest recognized breeds of cows in the world, is <http://www.ansi.okstate.edu/breeds/cattle/milkingshorthorn/index.htm>.

The terms of the milk share:

Brookridge Farm offers only whole milk and only in half gallons and gallons. They are ready and willing to deliver milk as often as we need it to meet the demand but have a minimum order amount. This means that if you sign up for a share, we need a full season guarantee* – if we can't meet the minimum order, no one gets milk! Milk shares are for the 19 weeks of the vegetable CSA. If you will not be available to pick up your milk share, please send someone to get it along with your vegetable share or talk with Sarah ahead of time to make other arrangements.

*If you need to withdraw early from the 2008 milk share, we will retain 25% of the remaining value of your share. Additionally, there is a very small chance that we will have to marginally increase the cost of your share mid-season to cover the costs of your milk. As the cost of grain and transportation continues to increase, the cost of producing a gallon of milk rises and that cost will be passed on to us.
